#### UST Names Trent Herman as New Lady Celts Head Volleyball Coach



A ugust will mark more than the beginning of the fall semester for the University of St. Thomas Lady Celts Volleyball team. It will be the beginning of a year under brand new tutelage from newly hired Volleyball Head Coach **Trent Herman**.

Herman, a native of Garden City, Kan., was a four-year starter for the Fort Hays State as an outside hitter from 1994-1997. He graduated from Fort Hays State University in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in history. He also coached the Southwest Minnesota Juniors Volleyball Club and held a club director position from 1997-1999.

Herman spent four years as an assistant volleyball coach and director of recruiting at Iowa State before moving to Rice University, where he helped nurture some student athletes who have ascended to the NCAA level in the past two years.

"The Celts program is very young and very successful, which is evident from their two consecutive Association of Independent Institutions conference titles," Herman said. "I would like to continue with the hard work and dedication that the athletes and coaches have instilled in this program and continue build up on it."

### UST to Participate in Direct Loan Program for the 2010-2011 School Year

University of St. Thomas students will see a significant change in the student loan program for federal loans in the 2010-2011 school year. UST will process all student loans through the Federal Direct Loan Program effective for the fall semester.

These low-interest loans help students and parents to pay for the cost of a student's college education. Direct loans are generally offered as part of a larger financial aid award package. This policy marks a change in the funding source, not a student's eligibility for loans.



"Students will apply for loans directly from the Department of Education and not from a bank or other financial institution," said Lynda McKendree, dean of scholarships and financial aid. "Direct loans simplify the process of students receiving the funding they need for their education."

Loans can be used to cover education expenses including tuition, room and board, fees, books, supplies, equipment, dependent child care expenses, transportation and rental or purchase of a personal computer.

The Office of Financial Aid will begin sending award letters with detailed instructions on how to apply for Direct Loans in late April. Students can apply for Direct Loans at www.dlenote.ed.gov. Information related to repayment is available online at www.dl.ed.gov. All applicants must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.gov.

#### One Password to Rule Them All




The University will imple-**▲** ment the Celt Login Authentication System Authentication System (CLAS), on Sunday, April 25.

During the implementation period, access to myStThom, Blackboard, off-campus library services, and Webmail will be unavailable. Access to the UST network, Outlook and Outlook Web Access will not be available to faculty and staff as well.

CLAS will allow users to log in to the previously mentioned services with a single username and password. Your username will now be referred to as the Celt Login ID, which faculty and staff will also use to access the UST network (OWA). All users will be required to activate their Celt Login ID by completing a secure account profile.

After activating their Celt Login ID, users will simply use their Celt Login ID and password to login to any service that displays the CLAS logo.
