Number 5, Travis Lampley, 5-foot-11-inch senior guard, is currently ranked No. 1 in total assists with 225, first in assists per game with 9.783 and ninth in total steals with 59

Caleb Williams, senior forward wearing the number 33 jersey has used his 3-pointers to contribute to his ranking of seventh in the division in 3-pointers, adding to his consecutive double-digit scoring in the last six games. Number 12 Adrian Morales lives on the

edge of the 3-point line. Morales' 3 balls have helped him retain a consecutive double digit score for the last six games.

Forward Byran Kaase, number 22, does a little bit of everything: scoring, rebounding and stealing. He

has made his mark posting conference numbers like 8 out of 8 at the free-throw line versus Texas Wesleyan and 10 out of 14 for 24 points against Our Lady of the Lake University.

What's in a number? With the Celts, the numbers 5, 12, 22 and 33 have contributed to 66 percent of the total score in their last five games scoring 273 out of the team total 414 points. ## Krustchinsky Leads Discussion on Education with China Delegation

Wanting to facilitate educational exchange with successful schools in China, Dr. Rick Krustchinsky, associate dean of the Undergraduate Program in the School of Education, along with a delegation of school principals and administrators from the Haidian Educational District, met to discuss the training of math and science teachers in Texas on Jan. 15.

Haidian is one of several districts of Beijing, China, and it is widely considered to be among the most elite school districts in all of China. Many students who are groomed for leadership in China receive their education in Haidian. In 2007, the City of Houston signed an agreement with Haidian by which both agreed to facilitate and promote exchanges in education.

Tyler Smith, coordinator of Special Projects and International Trade & Development for the Mayor's Office of the City of Houston, helped guide the delegation.

"The time Dr. Krustchinsky provided to the delegation contributed to their highly successful visit to Houston and has reinforced the ties between our city and one of its major international partners," Smith said.
